? The design, revision and up-gradation of the syllabi is done at the University level. A number of faculty members are in various Academic Committees of the university. They provide the feedback of course curriculum to university in order to enhance and upgrade the syllabi. However the college has its own mechanism for effective, documented curriculum delivery. ? At the beginning of each academic year, every faculty member provides the students with time plans and recommends reference books. These time plans are adhered to, so that the students are able to gauge with all clarity as to what portion of the curriculum will be delivered within the stipulated time frame. The time plans are discussed and reviewed in department level staff meetings. Besides traditional lectures and seminars, infrastructure for the use of ICT in classrooms, like power point presentations, smart boards and audio-visual support are all available to make the delivery of the curriculum instructive as well as interesting for the students. In some departments, the remedial classes are taken in order to make the curriculum delivery more holistic and effective. Tutorials are held with mentoring and participative learning.
