1.1 - Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 - The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

The University plays a key role in developing and updating the curriculum for all its affiliated colleges. To ensure smooth operations, academic committees are formed at the university level, consisting of faculty members from our college. These committees provide valuable insights and recommendations for improving the curriculum.

The curriculum delivery is structured, transparent, and well-documented. Faculty members represent the college in the Academic Council, Faculty Council, and Board of Studies (BOS), offering feedback on course creation and revisions. Departments hold regular meetings to discuss the curriculum, while each department creates its own activity calendar based on the university's schedule.

A timetable is made at the start of each academic session, posted on notice boards, through personal interactions and also through

social media. Teaching methods combine traditional approaches with modern ICT techniques to engage students. Internal assessments such as quizzes, projects, presentations, and group discussions are conducted regularly. Field Visits and trainings, are organized for the courses with such provisions in the curriculum.

Remedial classes are provided for weaker students, while meritorious students receive certificates and awards. Scholarships and fee reductions are available for students from low-income families. The college library is regularly updated, and e-resources are provided through INFLIBNET. Additionally, extension lectures, workshops, and field trips offer practical exposure. The IQAC hosts faculty development programs, extension lectures and faculty members are encouraged to attend Orientation/Refresher courses, conferences and seminars to enhance their expertise.

1. **Professional ethics** : Professional ethics is integrated into all professional courses offered at the institution, including M.Com, M.Sc and B.Sc F.D, B.Voc (Beauty and Culture), BCA, BBA and B.com. Professional ethics are to emphasize that students will not be subjected to discrimination on the grounds of caste, creed, race, religion, ethnicity, gender, age, or socioeconomic status.
2. **Human Values**: Human values are kept alive through compulsory and optional language subjects like Punjabi, Hindi, English and Punjab History and Culture.
3. **Environmental ethics**: Environment and Sustainability has been incorporated as a compulsory subject at undergraduate level. The course includes an in-depth study of ecosystems, environmental pollution. Fieldwork activities may include environmental impact assessments, biodiversity surveys, or waste management studies.
4. **Drug Abuse**:

The college has bodies like Red Ribbon Club and Buddy Group to host a number of outreach events, such as health awareness drives, de-addiction awareness programs, medical camps to instill social responsibility and values in students.

2.2.1 - The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organizes special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

On the first day of college, college organizes induction program for the students where students are formally welcomed by the Principal, who addresses them with an introduction to the college. Additionally, teachers introduce themselves and explain the college's operational structure and the evaluation system that will be followed. The program would help the students get familiarized with the teachers, history of college, facilities available, and various rules and regulations implemented within college etc.

- Students performance is initially assessed through class tests and mid-semester tests (MSTs). Based on their results, students are categorized
- Slow Learners: These students are identified and offered remedial classes to help them improve their understanding of the subjects and perform better in exams.
- Advanced Learners These students are given special attention, including additional notes and motivation from teachers to help them master their subjects and maintain their excellence. They are also encouraged to continue learning at a high level to keep up with university standards.
- To support all students, the college offers additional classes. Encourages participation in various extracurricular activities, including guest lectures, workshops, seminars, and quiz competitions. These activities are designed to promote a well-rounded understanding of various subjects.

2.3.1 - Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

The college employs a variety of student-centric methods to enhance the learning experience, focusing on experiential learning, participative learning, and problem-solving methodologies.

Experiments: Departments like Science, Fashion Designing, Fine Arts, Psychology, Home Science, Music Vocal, Beauty Culture and Cosmetology involve students in experiments.

Fieldwork and Community Outreach: Students engage in fieldwork, educational tours, industrial visits, internships, and research projects. Departments like Commerce and Fashion Designing involve students in projects and experiments, where they work on research reports, further honing their problem-solving and analytical skills.

Project-Based and Computer-Based Learning: Projects and technology-based learning are incorporated to allow students to work on real-world problems, enhancing their problem-solving skills and understanding of the subject matter

Group Discussions and Quizzes: To encourage critical thinking and problem-solving, students participate in group discussions, debate, subject quizzes, and Poster presentations

Workshops and Guest Lectures: At the departmental level, workshops, guest lectures, seminars, and exhibitions are organized to promote participative learning, allowing students to interact.

Participative learning is encouraged via role-play tree plantation drives, Red Cross activities, Swash Bharat initiatives, and health awareness camps.

The college supports student development through various forums, including the Career Counseling Cell, Placement Cell, and departmental clubs with experts and societies as members, and sometimes as presidents or secretaries, they take on responsibilities and participate in organizing extracurricular activities, which helps develop their leadership and organizational skills.

The internal evaluation follows GNDU guidelines, the college conducts mid semester exams/house tests as well as special tests (for those who fail or miss the house tests) once per semester. The mid semester exams are conducted at the college level with strict invigilation by the faculty members and as per the rules and regulations followed by the GNDU for the final examination.

- University has no provision for internal assessment in the form of any credit in the maximum marks for any of its courses except for B.Sc. Fashion designing in which marks are allotted on the basis of attendance, file work, practical efficiency and participation in departmental

activities.

A crucial aspect of the institution regarding educational approach is the ongoing evaluation of the teaching-learning process, which is overseen by the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC). Course outcomes are evaluated through timely syllabus coverage, class tests, mid-semester exams, departmental question paper preparation, and Viva Voce. After grading, performance analysis identifies strengths and weaknesses, allowing the college to assess attainment of outcomes. Based on this analysis, corrective actions are implemented to continuously improve educational practices and enhance student outcomes.

- Assignments are given to the students in the form of quizzes, written assignments, paper presentations, oral presentations, and fieldwork and evaluation takes place accordingly. Seminar presentation and they help in evaluating the attainment of courses.
- The Heads of Departments and teachers, work to ensure that courses are completed on schedule. For students who are struggling or performing average, extra classes are organized to help them to improve.
- To ensure students attend classes regularly, a 75% attendance requirement is enforced, which is necessary to be eligible for exams. The End Semester Exam is designed to test students' understanding of all topics covered in the course.

The soundproof seminar hall with LCD projectors can accommodate 100 people for various events.

Additional facilities include a hostel, cafeteria, open-air theatre, gym, parking, staff rooms, guest room, and a dedicated common room for girls. Unique spaces like the Heritage Centre and Sh. I.K. Sardana Memorial Hall, with seating for 1000 people, host various activities, while the Yoga Centre and Stress Management Cell promote well-being.

The institution is dedicated to environmental sustainability and actively minimizes its ecological footprint through innovative waste management technologies, adhering to the 3R policy i.e., Reduce, Reuse, Recycle. Color-coded dustbins (blue for glass, green for biodegradable, yellow for recyclables, and red for hazardous waste) are placed across the campus for effective waste segregation.

Solid Waste Management: Daily waste collection is sorted into dry and wet categories. Organic waste is decomposed using a horticultural pit, vermicompost, and dry leaves pit, producing nutrient-rich compost for gardening and reducing landfill pressure.

Liquid Waste Management: Garden sprinklers efficiently water plants, promoting sustainable landscaping.

E-Waste Management: E-waste is collected, stored in designated rooms, and disposed of annually. Old monitors and CPUs are repaired for reuse, while items like empty toners, cartridges, and outdated electronics are sold as scrap for safe recycling.

Hazardous Chemicals: While GNDU, the affiliating university, incorporates green experiments, the college has introduced micro-qualitative analysis in UG classes to minimize hazardous chemical usage.

Green Media: To reduce paper consumption, the institution uses social media platforms such as Facebook, Instagram, and WhatsApp to release circulars, notices, and event updates, adopting a sustainable communication approach.

The college offers financial assistance through scholarships. Under the Post Matric Scholarship for SC students, ₹28,50,054 was disbursed. The Society Scholarship provided ₹1,00,000 to needy students, and ₹1,84,000 was granted as fee concessions. The National Scholarship Program awarded ₹96,000, and the Charanjit Singh Bassi Memorial Trust granted ₹57,120 to 32 students.

Communal Harmony

The college fosters communal harmony through events like Teej, Green Diwali Carnival, and Young Voters Day, alongside voter awareness initiatives under SVEEP. Activities included cultural performances, Aadhaar updates, and seminars on voting rights. Celebrations such as Diwali at an old age home and quizzes promote inclusivity and social responsibility.

Group Discussions and Quizzes: To encourage critical thinking and problem-solving, students participate in group discussions, debate, subject quizzes, and Poster presentations

Workshops and Guest Lectures: At the departmental level, workshops, guest lectures, seminars, and exhibitions are organized to promote participative learning, allowing students to interact.

The internal evaluation follows GNDU guidelines, the college conducts mid semester exams/house tests as well as special tests (for those who fail or miss the house tests) once per semester. The mid semester exams are conducted at the college level with strict invigilation by the faculty members and as per the rules and regulations followed by the GNDU for the final examination.

- University has no provision for internal assessment in the form of any credit in the maximum marks for any of its courses except for B.Sc. Fashion designing in which marks are allotted on the basis of attendance, file work, practical efficiency and participation in departmental activities.
- The answer sheets, after being duly marked by the teacher are shown to the students in the classrooms so that they may note their mistakes and seek clarification for any doubts in the marking
- The faculty members conduct class tests after the completion of every unit or as per their syllabic schedule.
- To be eligible for the final and mid-semester exams, students must have at least 75% attendance in both theory classes and practical/laboratory sessions.

A crucial aspect of the institution regarding educational

approach is the ongoing evaluation of the teaching-learning process, which is overseen by the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC). Course outcomes are evaluated through timely syllabus coverage, class tests, mid-semester exams, departmental question paper preparation, and Viva Voce. After grading, performance analysis identifies strengths and weaknesses, allowing the college to assess attainment of outcomes. Based on this analysis, corrective actions are implemented to continuously improve educational practices and enhance student outcomes.

- Assignments are given to the students in the form of quizzes, written assignments, paper presentations, oral presentations, and fieldwork and evaluation takes place accordingly. Seminar presentation and they help in evaluating the attainment of courses.

The soundproof seminar hall with LCD projectors can accommodate 100 people for various events.

Additional facilities include a hostel, cafeteria, open-air theatre, gym, parking, staff rooms, guest room, and a dedicated common room for girls. Unique spaces like the Heritage Centre and Sh. I.K. Sardana Memorial Hall, with seating for 1000 people, host various activities, while the Yoga Centre and Stress Management Cell promote well-being.

The institution is dedicated to environmental sustainability and actively minimizes its ecological footprint through innovative waste management technologies, adhering to the 3R

policy i.e., Reduce, Reuse, Recycle. Color-coded dustbins (blue for glass, green for biodegradable, yellow for recyclables, and red for hazardous waste) are placed across the campus for effective waste segregation.

Solid Waste Management: Daily waste collection is sorted into dry and wet categories. Organic waste is decomposed using a horticultural pit, vermicompost, and dry leaves pit, producing nutrient-rich compost for gardening and reducing landfill pressure.

Liquid Waste Management: Garden sprinklers efficiently water plants, promoting sustainable landscaping.

E-Waste Management: E-waste is collected, stored in designated rooms, and disposed of annually. Old monitors and CPUs are repaired for reuse, while items like empty toners, cartridges, and outdated electronics are sold as scrap for safe recycling.

Hazardous Chemicals: While GNDU, the affiliating university, incorporates green experiments, the college has introduced micro-qualitative analysis in UG classes to minimize hazardous chemical usage.

Green Media: To reduce paper consumption, the institution uses social media platforms such as Facebook, Instagram, and WhatsApp to release circulars, notices, and event updates, adopting a sustainable communication approach.
